

Handbell ensembles rehearse on Tuesday evenings, children's choir rehearses on Wednesday evenings, and the adult choir rehearses Sunday afternoons.



STEWARDSHIP NEWS!

WHAT I HAVE LEARNED ABOUT STEWARDSHIP THE LAST TWO YEARS

1.Stewardship, Generosity, and Giving are not synonymous! Most people think, when they hear the word Stewardship, strictly in terms of a church wanting your money. The terms Stewardship, Generosity, and Giving are often used interchangeably and they confuse people. Stewardship is simply the act of being a steward. In biblical times a steward was a respected person of high integrity entrusted with his master's possessions. He was expected to manage the possessions following the masters wishes. Since God created the world and every thing in it (even us and the talents he gave us) then stewardship is recognizing that God is the owner and we are his managers. As managers and believers, we are responsible for using God's possessions to please and worship Him - not to use "our" possesions to get rewards in heaven. The first step in becoming a good steward is recognizing and accepting that God owns and has given us all that we have.

Generosity stems from the Lord loving a generous giver. What would it look like to have a congregation of joyful, generous gospel stewards? Stewardship is also what we do with what God has entrusted to us. Vibrant Christian stewardship includes what we do on God's behalf in our relationships; giving of time, skills, abilities, and passions, and management and sharing or giving of possessions; and current and planned.

2. Stewardship is more about spiritual growth than Dollars and Cents or giving of time, talent, and treasure.

It is estimated that 25 - 50% of church attendees give nothing or next to nothing. The lack of giving is not a financial problem but a spiritual one. God is a giver. Our willingness to give reveals our relationship to God. Ask God via prayer to guide you and provide for your needs so you can give what he wants you to - to help others. So, as you pray and talk with him daily, you will find that you grow in your faith. In other words, the quality of your spiritual life grows. Your faith is stronger, you worry less, you are more joyful because your giving and sharing of your time, talents, and resources is an act of worship and thankfulness.

3. True stewardship is about hearts and not just giving of our time, talents, and treasure.

As with most things, stewardship is a heart matter. Such faithful stewardship grows not from membership or rules, numbers or percentages, but from a grateful response to God's initial outpouring of love and covenant faithfulness to us. Remember He tells us that the greatest commandment of all is to love. If we model this commandment in our lives, then we end up living out of God's abundance instead of sinking into scarcity thinking. We nurture generous living in ourselves and others, encouraging one another to trust God's empowering work among us.

Stewardship is our response to who God is, who we are in Christ, and what He commands us to do. Giving generously causes us to reprioritize our lives, seeking to offer to God the first and the best of all that God has given us and managing all the rest according to God's generosity. Jeremy Sets His Sights Higher!

Eighteen-year-old Jeremy last saw his mother when he was 3 years old. Throughout most of life, his father was away, serving time in prison. So, Jeremy was raised in part by his strict, loving grandparents. Unfortunately, by the time he reached high school, his grandfather had passed away and his grandmother had developed dementia. Subsequent living arrangements with various relatives and acquaintances failed to work out. Entering his teen years, his grades plummeted, and he ran away several times. He spent time in an alternative school. His guardian eventually sent him to live at Epworth.

Quiet and reserved by nature, Jeremy arrived at Epworth unsure of himself and shaken by the chaos he had experienced. He missed his friends, felt selfconscious about his appearance, and was nervous about attending a new school. "I didn't want to come to Epworth at first," he said. "But it was OK once I started making friends. Looking back, I feel like God was just lining things up for me." Epworth's Faith Formation Director Jennifer Stanley remembers Jeremy's first day at Epworth. "I remember he quietly told me he liked basketball," she said.

"Now, he plays in a community basketball league, and you can find him showing his younger peers how to do a layup and cheering them on from the sidelines. Watching him come out of his shell was inspiring."

At Epworth, Jeremy's grades soared; his senior year, he made all A's, even while working a part-time job at a local grocery store. "Jeremy came to me several times to talk about his options for higher education," said Christy Mooneyhan, academic director of Epworth's Barnes Learning Center. "We discussed finances and long-term goals and how each option fit into what he ultimately wanted to do in life. I was always amazed at his maturity in looking at the big picture and how his choices now would impact him later in life. He was very engaged in looking for scholarship opportunities as he knew he had few resources for paying for his education. His initiative was a true testament to the maturity he has gained since arriving at Epworth."

Jeremy graduated from high school in May. The University of South Carolina offered him a place in its freshman class of 2024, and he has been awarded \$3,500 in private scholarships. He recently moved from Epworth's residential campus to the Independent Living Center where he can live at no charge while he completes college. He is searching for a paid internship, ideally with a law firm. He dreams of becoming an attorney. "I want to use my life to help people,"



Jeremy said. "I want to take the hard situations people find themselves in and make it better for them. Also, lawyers make a decent living, which is important to me because when I have a family, I'm going to make sure it's a stable home... like Ms. Deanna's family."

Deanna was one of Jeremy's house parents at Epworth. She introduced him to her mom, dad and siblings, and Jeremy saw something he wanted in his life...a loving, supportive family that attends church and has fun together. Church has become important to Jeremy. "Before, I never went to church regularly," he said. "Epworth gave me the chance and the freedom to explore a relationship with God. As a result, I'm starting to care less about how people look at me. Now, when I'm nervous, I think about Jesus, what he went through when he was persecuted, and it helps take me out of myself and my fears. "


His faith and personal discipline have helped Jeremy turn the difficult challenges in his young life into strengths. "I've never vaped or used drugs," he said. "I pride myself on staying away from that kind of thing and resisting peer pressure. I've seen how it's where a lot of lives go wrong." Jeremy started college this fall. He is also pleased that while living at Epworth his father began calling him regularly from prison. Like others in Jeremy's expanding circle of support, Jeremy's dad is rooting for him to succeed.
