Overcoming Fears

From a young age, I've always had a deep love for the water. Some of my earliest memories are of swimming at my uncle's house on what we called "The River," now known as Lake Wylie. Every summer, my family would vacation at the beach, where I could happily spend the entire week in the pool. In third grade, we moved to Greenwood, where my sibling and I joined the local swim team, and I quickly grew to love summers filled with water skiing, floating on rafts, and swimming. By the time I was fourteen, I started assisting a swim instructor and lifeguard at the YMCA. That early experience led me to manage a private pool for ten summers, where I taught both group and private swim lessons. One of the greatest blessings of my life has been teaching more than a hundred children each summer—mostly through word-of-mouth referrals.

One summer during a beach vacation, my dad decided we should all go deep-sea fishing. At first, I thought it sounded like a fun adventure—until I realized just how far offshore they planned to go. When he said we might be twenty miles out at sea, I panicked. In the end, the rest of my family went without me. Since then, I've had several chances to go on a cruise, but I always say no. The only cruise I've ever taken was along the Nile River—where the shoreline is always in sight. Maybe that's part of why I've always been drawn to lighthouses. They're a reminder that even in life's darkest moments, there's often a ray of hope guiding us back to solid ground.

We are reminded in John 1: ff "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was God...in him was life, and the life was the light of people.

The light shines in the darkness and did not overcome it."

I often wonder how many lives have been saved because of the mission of lighthouses. Their history stretches back as far as 280 BC, with the famous Lighthouse of Alexandria, built by the Pharos to mark the harbor and aid in navigation. In ancient times, lighthouses were often nothing more than fires lit on

hilltops, guiding countless maritime travelers to safety. As lighthouse technology evolved in the 18th and 19th centuries, they became even more effective at saving lives. Today, many have been beautifully restored and equipped with modern innovations like LED lights, fog horns, and solar-powered batteries—continuing their legacy of guiding people safely through the storm.

I see May as both a time to celebrate and a time to reflect. It's a month filled with meaningful events—the Annual Strawberry Festival, the National Day of Prayer, Mother's Day, Memorial Day, graduations, and the close of another school year. But beyond the celebrations, May invites personal reflection. Did I give my best in school this year? Was I the best mom I could be? Has school truly prepared me for the work ahead, or is it time to keep learning and growing? I'm especially grateful for the men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice to protect our freedom. Memorial Day is more than just a holiday—it's a reminder of what matters, and the cost of what we so often take for granted.

This year, I choose to both reflect and celebrate. I want to take a closer look at my deep fear of water—where it comes from and how I might begin to understand it. I've always dreamed of seeing the Panama Canal, yet the thought of getting there without stepping onto a cruise ship still feels uncertain. At the same time, I want to celebrate the relationships in my life—to truly acknowledge the people who matter most and let them know how deeply they are appreciated. So join me as we step into May with intention, embracing both reflection and celebration. Let's lean into the light—the kind that helps us face our fears and push through the darkness, together.

I look forward to seeing you at St. John's, where light always helps us overcome the darkness.






W.E.E. School Summer Camp

Humility: How does this character trait help us to be a good Steward of the many gifts God has given us?



Acknowledging God's Ownership:

As Christians who follow God's commands to become a good Steward of the gifts he has given us, it's essential to recognize that everything we have comes from God. In Psalm 24:1, we are reminded, "The earth is the Lord's, Go everything in it, the world, and all who live in it." This truth should shape our perspective on possessions and resources. Rather than claiming ownership, we must humbly acknowledge that we are merely stewards entrusted with managing what truly belongs to God.

Embracing this mindset frees us from the grip of materialism and self-centeredness. 



destined to be a very tall and broad-shouldered man one day, but right now he is in the sometimes awkward development stage that accompanies the early teenage years. Yet his physical appearance is countered by a quiet and soft-spoken personality.

He still has a lot of growth in front of him, but with each day at Epworth he is walking with more confidence into the future.
